





"And as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal life."

Jesus Christ came to redeem humankind, to reveal the true loving character of God, to overcome Satan, to proof that Adam could've lived a life without sin... Why else did Jesus came?

The sacrifice of Jesus as "the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world" (Jn. 1:29) means more than just His death at the cross. Its meaning was told long before His short years of ministry.

  - **→** He died for me
  - The power of the cross



### PREPARED

"He indeed was foreordained before the foundation of the world, but was manifest in these last times for you." (1 Peter 1:20)




Jesus is introduced as sacrificed or slain "from the foundation of the world" (Rev. 13:8). This doesn't mean that Jesus died when the world was created. As Peter explained, Jesus was "foreordained" to offer Himself as a sacrifice in case humans sinned (1P. 1:20).



The lamb in the Passover was separated on the 10th day to be sacrificed on the 14th day. Jesus was prepared since the beginning for the moment of His sacrifice.

Thanks to that preparation, God could show how salvation was going to work through the sacrifice system. This way people could find hope and salvation even before Jesus was sacrificed at the cross.



## ANNOUNCED

"They will scourge Him and kill Him. And the third day
He will rise again." (Luke 18:33)

Jesus announced His death at the cross for the first time during His private conversation with Nicodemus (Jn. 3:14-15).


During His last year of ministry, He told His disciples three times that He had to die:

In Caesarea Philippi. Peter wanted Jesus to avoid it (Mt. 16:21-23)

Passing through Galilee. The disciples were afraid of asking Him about it (Mr. 9:30-32)

Near Jerusalem, where "this saying was hidden from them" (Lk. 18:31-34)

Jesus' death went against their idea of a triumphant Messiah. They couldn't understand what Jesus was announcing, that He had to die to save humankind.









## SACRIFICED

"So when Jesus had received the sour wine, He said, 'It is finished!' And bowing His head, He gave up His spirit." (John 19:30)




Jesus voluntarily endured humiliation and anguish in His way to the cross (Phlp. 2:8).

Satan moved those people to crucify the Savior, and to encourage Him to come down the cross and save Himself (Mt. 27:42).



Jesus Himself announced that evil and sin had been overcome: "It is finished."







"When Christ cried out, 'It is finished,' the unfallen worlds were made secure. For them the battle was fought and the victory won. Henceforth Satan had no place in the affections of the universe. # THE MEANING OF HIS SACRIFICE

## HE DIED FOR ME

"For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life." (John 3:16)

None of the millions of sacrificed animals since the fall of Adam and Eve until Nisan 14, 27 AD could take away our sin (Heb. 10:1-4).

Only the Creator could offer Himself as a substitute for sinners, thus paying the price of their sin: eternal death (Ro. 6:23).







His death was unique and unrepeatable. It can forgive any sin committed both before it and after it (Heb. 9:24-28).

It's enough to forgive my sin (Acts 10:43).

### THE POWER OF THE CROSS

"For the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God." (1 Corinthians 1:18)

#### What is the power of the cross?

- It's the ultimate revelation of God's justice against sin (Ro. 3:21-26)
- It's the ultimate revelation of God's love for sinners (Ro. 5:8)
- It's the ultimate source of power to break the chains of sin (Ro. 6:22-23)
- It's our only hope of eternal life (1Jn. 5:11-12)
- It's the only antidote for a future rebellion in the Universe (Rev. 7:13-17)
